Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

As is customary as we approach the end of the liturgical year, the focus of today's readings is on the end times. Jesus offers a daunting description of what lies ahead for humankind – wars, insurrections, famines, plagues, natural disasters, false prophets – a long and terrifying list. It also seems it will be a scary time to be a disciple, as other hallmarks will be persecution, false imprisonment, abandonment and betrayal by family and friends, and even death.

The first reading from Malachi is also a foreshadowing of what is coming at the end of time, but the terrifying inferno he envisions is aimed only for evildoers. For followers of the Lord, the aftermath of this scorching is the rising of the sun of justice, whose warmth brings healing, not destruction. The psalm continues in this vein reminding us that the second coming of the Lord may be heralded by fearful events but it is ultimately a wonderful thing for humanity. The Lord will rule the earth with the justice and equity that has proven elusive in the society constructed and led by humans. It will be a time when all creation will unite in praise of God. We will experience a kind of joy, peace, and unity that is unimaginable and indescribable – the Kingdom of God will finally be here.

We may wonder why a God who loves us would visit on us the devastation that Jesus describes in the Gospel. Surely God could just skip ahead to the rejoicing and unity? But everything Jesus describes is already part of our world. Not in the precise order that will presage the end times, but wars, insurrections, famines, religious persecution, internecine violence, family conflict, and natural disasters are part of our world today. These are not the actions of God, but the consequences of sin and human frailty. Implicit in His promise to be with us through the end times, guarding and guiding us, is a promise that He is with us as we face the calamities of our day. In the midst of devastation on every scale – from international wars to our own personal tragedies, God is ready to help us – to give us wisdom, to help us be fearless and resolute, to help us to persevere and thus secure our eternal lives in God's perfect kingdom.

I wish you and your loved ones blessings of good health and new hope. Please continue to pray for peace,

Scripture Reflection

In the Gospel today Jesus gives a chilling account of the end times. There will be false prophets to resist, wars to survive, natural disasters to outlive and persecutions to endure. This the end for which Jesus often admonishes to "stay awake" and "be ready." As a Jewish reformer, Jesus frequently spoke and acted in ways that called into question religious structures, both external and internal, that impeded right relationship with God and one another. But for any Jew, the destruction of the temple by Roman imperial forces would provoke a severe crisis. Everything would have to be re-signified. The temple symbolized their connection with God and with their fellow believers. Luke's Gospel, of course, was written fifteen years after the temple had been razed. We can imagine the struggles of the Jewish Christian members of the Lukan community who had to redefine their Jewishness, not only in the absence of their temple, but also as members of a mixed community of Gentiles and Jewish followers of Jesus. The Gentile members also had to reconstruct their internal architecture when they took on a Christian identity. In today's Gospel, there is a progression, as the discussion moves from the destruction of the temple to cataclysmic happenings that wreak destruction on the earth and among peoples, and finally, to threats against one's life. When disciples are seized and persecuted and handed over to the authorities because of Jesus' name. these are times to testify to the power of God. In the first reading, Malachi foresees the same end times that Jesus describes. In his vision, heat plays a role. It is destructive to evil doers, setting them ablaze and leaving room for goodness in its wake. The goodness also comes in the form of heat – the "sun of justice." These rays through are healing, nourishing good things where once the evil ones would have crowded them out. This echoes the Gospel's reassurance that we will not face the terrors of the end times alone – Jesus will be with us through all their trials. The psalm reminds us that terrifying as these images are, it is not destruction for destruction's sake. The devastation of the end times will make room for God to come in and rule the earth once and for all. It is, in the end, a cause for hope and joy.

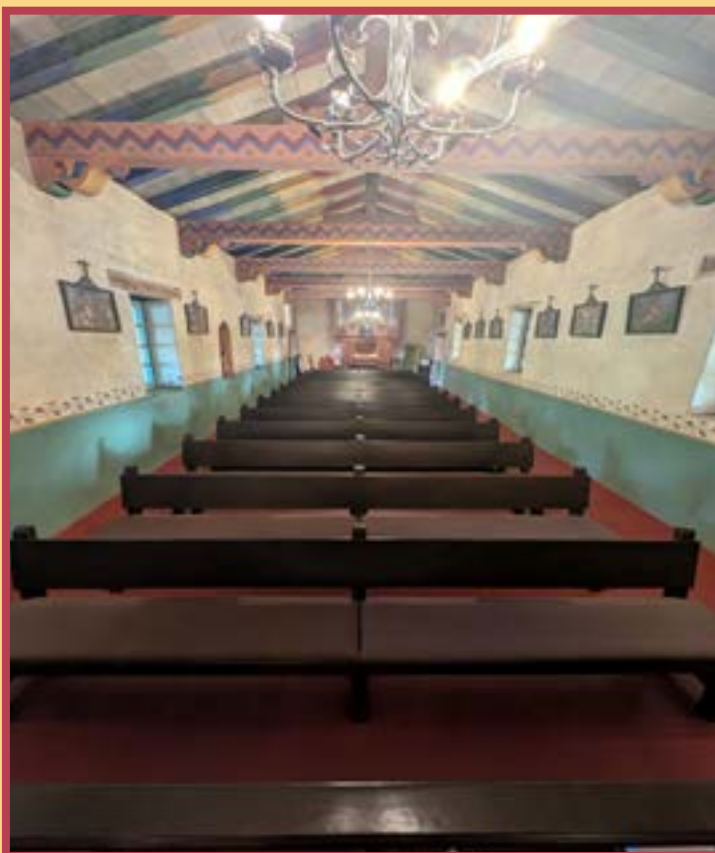

The Carmel Mission Basilica is launching a strategic master plan initiative with a goal of creating a guide to preserve, restore, and utilize this iconic landmark that has attracted the faithful and visitors to Carmel since it was built more than 250 years ago.

The development of the comprehensive Master Property Plan will be in partnership with Architectural Resources Group, a nationally recognized preservation and planning firm out of San Francisco.

Architectural Resources Group was founded 45 years ago and specializes in architecture, historic preservation, adaptive reuse, and planning with projects across California and the Western United States. Locally, its portfolio includes the Cooper-Molera Adobe Historic site in Monterey and the Sunset Center in Carmel.

The architectural firm says that since its beginning, it has had the privilege of working with great clients and consultants on projects that preserve, protect, and adapt historic buildings, sites, and objects for a new generation.

"We're honored to continue our work with Carmel Mission. This is a pivotal project for the Mission and for the wider community", said David Wessel, principal at Architectural Resources Group, in a press release. "Our goal is to create a plan that respects Carmel Mission's rich past and supports its thriving future."

Carmel Mission Basilica says this initiative marks a milestone in the mission's commitment to stewarding its historic buildings, sacred spaces, and cultural resources for future generations.

Carmel Mission, or Mission San Carlos Borromeo de Río Carmelo, was founded in 1771 by Father Junipero Serra, who was canonized in 2015 and is now known as Saint Junipero Serra. He is buried under the sanctuary floor. The mission was the second mission founded by Serra, and where he established his headquarters. It is designated a National Historic Landmark, is one of California's most visited historic sites, and continues to serve a vibrant parish community within the Diocese of Monterey.



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ARCHITECTURAL RESOURCES GROUP

The new Master Property Plan will guide the preservation, restoration, and use of the 22-acre site, which includes the Basilica Church, museums, courtyards, cemetery, and other historic structures, according to Carmel Mission. Architectural Resources Group brings decades of expertise in working with culturally significant sites, including previous work with missions, churches, and historic campuses across the West.

"This is a moment of renewal," said Father Paul P. Murphy, pastor of the Carmel Mission Basilica, in the release. "We are embracing our responsibility to protect the sacred and historical integrity of this site, while also ensuring it can meet the evolving needs of our parish and the wider community."

The planning process will include input from parishioners, community members, preservationists, and expert restorative professionals, according to Carmel Mission. Priorities include seismic safety, accessibility improvements, landscape conservation, infrastructure modernization, and enhanced interpretive and visitor experiences.

Development of the Master Property Plan is expected to continue through 2026.

The Carmel Mission has undergone other restoration projects in the recent past, namely the Downie Museum and Basilica Forecourt project in 2021, the Central Courtyard project in 2016, and the Carmel Mission Basilica's structural restoration in 2013.

But the Carmel Mission has a long history of restoration beginning in 1877, when Fr. Angelo Casanova stepped in to save a church reduced to ruins, according to Carmel Mission Basilica. With the roof collapsed and walls crumbling, he paid \$44 to re-roof the sacristy. What started as a humble act became an enduring commitment to restore Carmel Mission's historic fabric for generations to come.

In the early 1900s, Monsignor Ramon Mestres founded the Carmel Mission Restoration League, spearheading major restorations and earning the title "Padre of the Restoration." Then in 1933, master restorer Harry Downie began five decades of meticulous rebuilding, working under the direction of multiple pastors throughout his tenure to transform the Mission into what we see today.

FIRST LIBRARY OF CALIFORNIA

Today I'd like to say a bit more about the current project to produce a detailed, accurate, and complete catalog for our First Library. This is an effort that has taken the better part of two years and should be completed by the end of this year. There have been catalogs of our library in the past, but none of them can be considered a full catalog in the modern sense.

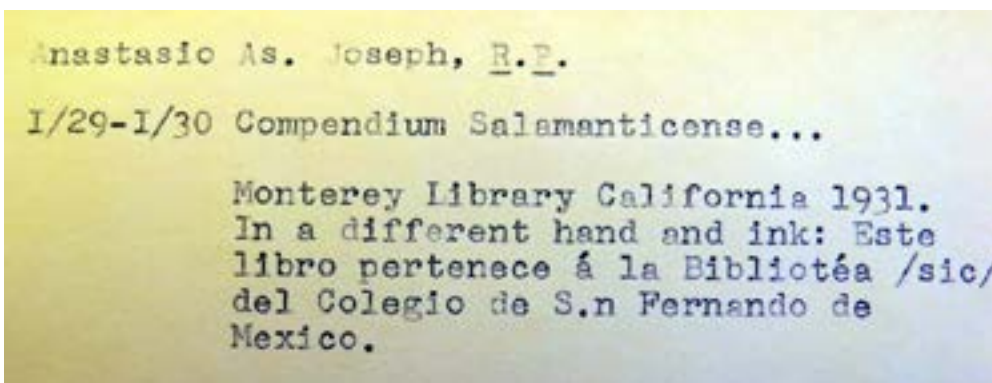


The very first list of the books in the Convento library was compiled by Father José Maria del Real in 1834. He was responsible for compiling an inventory and valuation of the entire mission in preparation for its dissolution. This first inventory listed 404 books. Many are now difficult to identify, given that Father Real only listed a cursory title, maybe an author, and an estimated value, but no date of publication or other information we would now expect.

Some eight years later in 1842, Father Real compiled another list of the books, which had by then been moved to the parish in Monterey. This list was shorter and even more cursory. Then the books went to sleep for the next 100 years. It wasn't until 1932 that Monsignor James Culleton produced a more complete and detailed list of the books that were still a part of the parish property. That list is now in the diocesan archives.

Harry Downie reestablished the library in its current location in Carmel in 1949. In 1956, he engaged Sylvia Broadbent, then a graduate student at Berkeley, to compile a bibliographically correct card catalog of all the books in the library. These 3x5 typewritten cards are still kept at UC Berkeley, and they are an important source of information on the state of the library at the time.

FIRST LIBRARY OF CALIFORNIA

A later catalog or list was supposedly compiled by a young man named Brian Shanley around 1971, but no trace of it can be found today. Another cataloging effort was undertaken in 2006, but it is unfortunately incomplete and insufficient to current needs.

The present project aims to accomplish several things. The first step in the process was the establishment of a detailed digital photographic record of all the volumes. This included images of the binding and spine, the title page and last page, and other pages with interesting inscriptions and provenance evidence. Over 5,000 images were cataloged. Next a so-called short title catalog was compiled. This is an abbreviated listing of all 568 volumes with a short title, author, and production information, including place and date of printing along with the printer's name. This catalog is organized both by shelf order and alphabetically by author and can serve to find the location of any given book more easily.

The final, full title catalog will be a much more detailed accounting of each individual book, including a complete title, author dates, physical information such as number of pages, size, and condition. Finally, any inscriptions or writings or marks in the book are identified and transcribed, providing valuable clues as to the book's previous owners and its institutional homes. The catalog seeks to capture every piece of evidence that identifies each individual book. This will be supplemented by an image of the spine and title page to accompany the written text. In its paper form, the catalog will span over 1,000 pages in several volumes. A digital version will also be available.

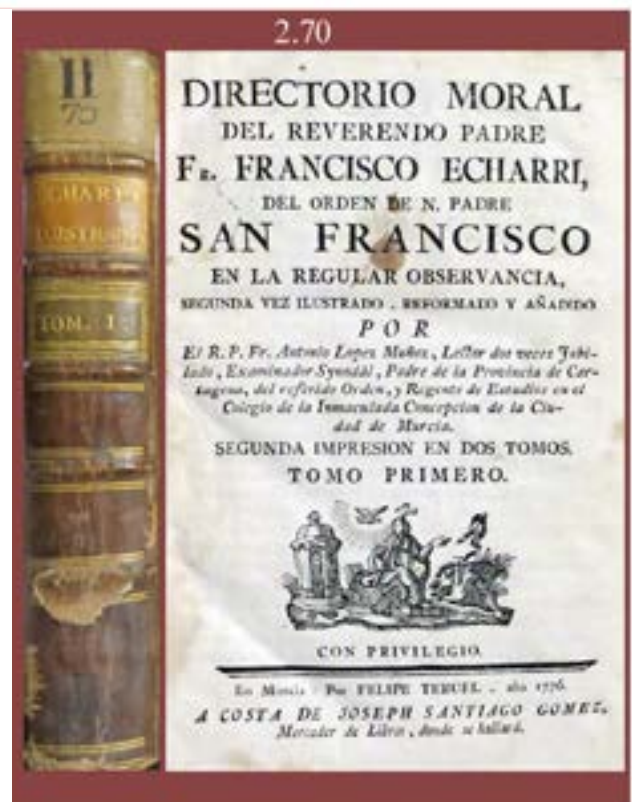

We are grateful that this matter has been resolved, and we look forward to the Carmel Mission Foundation (CMF) supporting the restoration work identified through the master property planning effort Carmel Mission Basilica (CMB) has developed in partnership with Architectural Resources Group (ARG).

Joint Statement Regarding Resolution of Litigation between the Diocese of Monterey and the Carmel Mission Foundation

In May 2023, we, the Diocese of Monterey Parish and Schools Operating Corporation (DOM) filed a complaint in Monterey County Superior Court against the Carmel Mission Foundation (CMF) citing concerns that CMF members planned to shut down the Foundation and hand over the moneys meant for the restoration of the Carmel Mission to another nonprofit. After receiving detailed project-related financial information and after conducting further investigation, the DOM is now satisfied that CMF had always intended that moneys meant for the restoration of the Carmel Mission be used for that purpose, has no plans to shut down, and that there is no evidence of any wrongdoing or impropriety on the part of CMF or any CMF board member. As a result, the DOM and Carmel Mission Basilica are pleased to move forward with the CMF as a fundraising partner to assist with the preservation, restoration, and maintenance of the historic Mission San Carlos Borromeo de Carmelo.
