**Sunday, December 14, 2025**



Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

Just one week ago, we found the eccentric preacher John the Baptist brimming with hope and vigor. He was confidently preaching the coming of the long – awaited Messiah. Fueled by a profound love of God and deep commitment to helping people be ready for God’s coming, his, at times wild, efforts drew the attention of the authorities, who were not looking forward to the coming of any Messiah who would upset their tyrannical apple cart. By the time of today’s Gospel John is in prison, his days are numbered, and he is beginning to experience the doubts we all experience in life. Did he make a difference? He had given up everything to proclaim the coming of the Messiah, Jesus, but was he right?

John sends his disciples to ask Jesus directly. Jesus knows that a mere yes or no will not bring John the certainty, comfort, and encouragement he needs. Jesus points out the evidence that John’s preaching was completely on target. Through Jesus’ ministry, to which John pointed, people who could not previously do so are now seeing, walking, and hearing. Many are healed and restored to life. Poor people are heartened with good news. All the soil so faithfully tilled and tended by John is now bearing the long-awaited fruit. Jesus says to the crowds that John was “more than a prophet” and that there had been “none greater than John the Baptist.” Presumably, this assurance was conveyed to John, giving him heart to be able to quell his doubts and endure patiently to the end.

On this Gaudete Sunday, we are asked not just to endure waiting, but to rejoice in it. We may find an answer to this challenge in Jesus’ comforting message to John – the evidence of God’s presence and action in the world is seeable and knowable now. We can certainly point to ways in which the perfect Kingdom, free of hatred, division, and war, is not here yet. But we can just as easily find examples, large and small, in which people are working towards that Kingdom with faith and goodwill. For every warmonger, there are more peacemakers, for every act of violence, more acts of kindness. I invite you to join me this week in working to contribute to the evidence of God’s goodness in the world, and help build up God’s Kingdom.

I wish you and you loved ones Advent blessings of good health and persistent hope. Please continue to pray for peace,

# FINANCE COUNCIL REPORT

The Finance Council serves as a consultative body to Fr. Paul, helping ensure responsible stewardship of parish resources and supporting the Church's mission. Its core responsibilities include:

- **Advising Fr. Paul**  
Offering guidance on financial decisions, planning, and administration in accordance with Church and diocesan policies.
- **Budgeting and Oversight**  
Assisting in the preparation, review, and monitoring of the parish budget to ensure fiscal responsibility.
- **Stewardship and Fundraising**  
Promoting a culture of generosity and helping plan fundraising efforts to support parish ministries and operations.
- **Financial Reporting**  
Reviewing financial statements and ensuring transparency and accountability to the parish community.
- **Asset and Property Management**  
Supporting the maintenance and development of parish facilities and long-term capital planning.
- **Compliance and Best Practices**  
Ensuring adherence to legal, ethical, and diocesan financial guidelines.



This year marked a significant milestone in the development of the Mission's Master Property Plan, made possible through the new partnership with the Architectural Resources Group (ARG). ARG has already played a vital role in the design and engineering of the improved accessibility project currently under construction at the entrance to the Blessed Sacrament Chapel. In collaboration with Mission staff, ARG is also evaluating additional areas for accessibility improvements, including the ramp entrance to Crespi Hall.

In last year's report, I highlighted our investment in MaintainX, a state-of-the-art maintenance management system. I am pleased to share that the initial data entry, covering the many details of our facilities, is now complete. MaintainX is actively supporting our staff in managing the daily upkeep of our expansive 22-acre campus.

While we moved forward with several budgeted projects this past year, we were constantly reminded of the "unplanned"—often costly and frequently complex—maintenance issues that arise daily. We are deeply grateful to our Mission staff for their prompt and effective response to these ongoing challenges.

As noted elsewhere in this Annual Report, Carmel Mission remains in a strong financial position, thanks to the continued generosity of our parishioners. Although we were fortunate to have achieved a budget surplus again this past year, ongoing contributions remain essential to support the extensive restoration, enhancement, and preservation needs of Carmel Mission.

On behalf of Fr. Paul, I extend heartfelt thanks to the members of our Finance Council for their dedicated service and unwavering support throughout the year.

# **FINANCIAL OVERVIEW**

We are happy to report a healthy fiscal year that ended with a significant surplus over our budget due in large part to a number of generous contributions.

## **Savings & Debt**

Our current debt totals \$835,770 which is an 8.55% reduction from last year. Without question, the greatest impact on our debt reduction has been due to the overwhelming generosity of our parishioners.

## **Income**

On the revenue side, our plate collections equaled 100.60% of the prior year.



## **Expenses**

Fr. Paul kept expenses under the budgeted amounts. Total expenses were 86% to budget.

## **Restoration Work**

Several key restoration projects were continued from 2023-24 and several new projects were initiated.



## **Generous Gifts**

Carmel Mission is very fortunate to receive generous and unique gifts, and 2025 was no exception. Significant restricted gifts will continue to assist us with our expected repairs and maintenance in 2025-2026. Kindly contact Fr. Paul if you have any gifts you would consider donating to the Carmel Mission.

## **Impactful Conditions**

We saw a 2% increase in visitors to Carmel Mission this past year, and we hope this upward trend continues along with local area tourism. We also welcomed 126 new parishioners this past fiscal year.



## 2024 & 2025 AMA CAMPAIGN UPDATES - BSC & MORA CHAPEL

We are very happy to report the success of our 2025 AMA Campaign - The Mora Chapel – A Place of Living History. Our AMA total to date is \$325,390 (including our \$75,900.00 donation to the Diocesan ministries). Though we promote our annual fundraising campaign in the early to late spring, we continue receiving donations until the end of the year.

### AMA Updates

- We continue to work diligently on developing the 2025 Mora Chapel restoration and conservation projects and will share details in upcoming bulletins and on our AMA webpage.
- In the Blessed Sacrament Chapel, the pews have been restored and upholstery has been added. The ramp construction is in progress and the floor will be refinished.

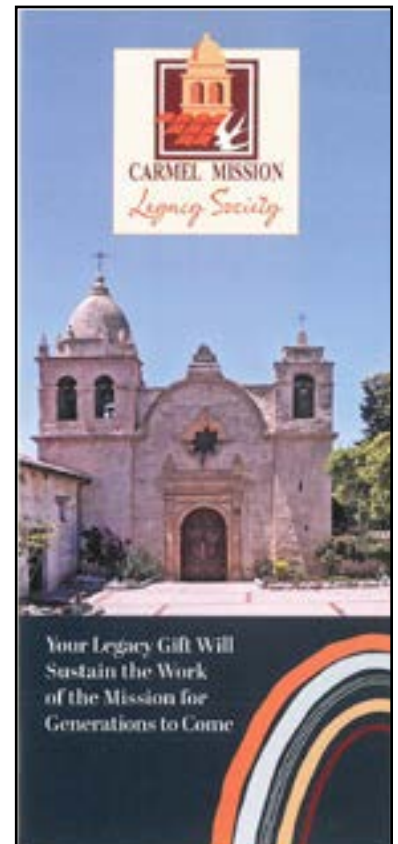
### Parish and Community Impact

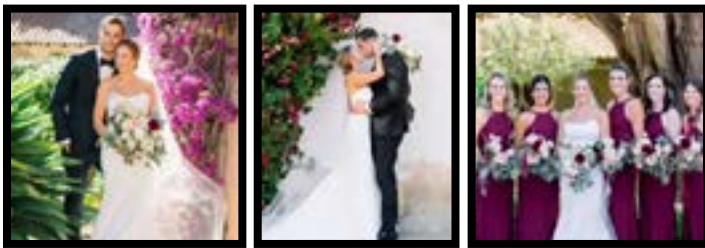

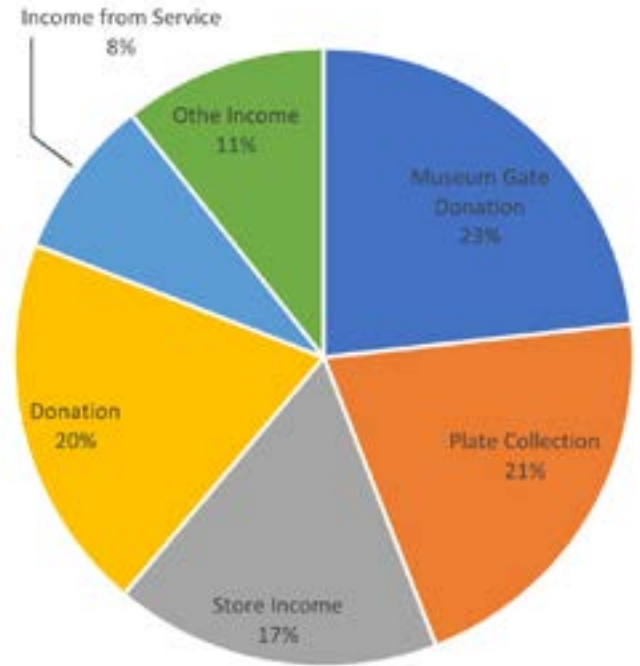

## Scripture Reflection

As we reach the halfway point of Advent, the readings for today seem less focused on preparation and more on enduring the wait. God is coming, but not quite yet. John the Baptist, seen last week as a fiery preacher, seems particularly impatient – is Jesus the expected Messiah or is He not? Each reading encourages patience in the wait for God's coming. Written during the time of exile, Isaiah looks forward to a joyful return to Jerusalem. James encourages patience in waiting for the second coming of Christ. Jesus responds to John's impatience in the expectation of the Messiah. Together, they remind us that God's Kingdom is a promise that will come true, if not quite yet. In the first reading, Isaiah invites us to be filled with joy and gladness, and to express this in singing and rejoicing, even when all seems desolate. The exiles have yet to see any concrete signs for restoration. Even before experiencing the anticipated healing and rebuilding, they are to enter in the ruined city singing for joy. This is not a naïve refusal to see things how they are, but an expression of hope that springs from a deep conviction that God's saving deeds in the past will be manifest in the present and future as well, for all who have eyes to see. The very expectation that the parched wasteland will yield fragrant blossoms begins to bring it into being. While awaiting the fulfillment of our expectations and longings, the letter of James exhorts us to be patient. Just as Jesus helped John's disciples to see the evidence of God's saving presence in their midst, so James urges us to look for sprouts of hope that spring up even in the most parched desert. Expecting the desert to bloom – or roses in December as did Juan Diego, whom we remembered on the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe last Tuesday – we keep hope alive with patient endurance even in the midst of suffering and doubt. The psalm reminds us that God is a God of action. God cares for the oppressed, the blind, the hungry, the fatherless, the widow. God is present and at work in the world today, even as we wait in expectation for Jesus' coming again.

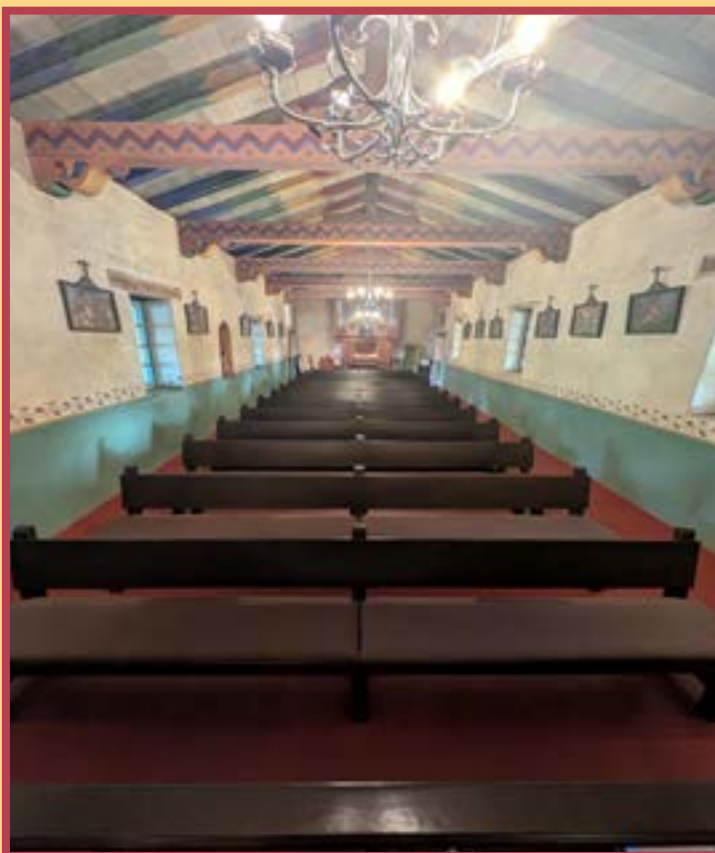
## A PLACE OF LIVING HISTORY

THE HISTORIC CARMEL MISSION BASILICA HAS  
ANNOUNCED THE DEVELOPMENT OF A COMPREHENSIVE  
MASTER PROPERTY PLAN IN PARTNERSHIP WITH  
ARCHITECTURAL RESOURCES GROUP.

The Carmel Mission Basilica is launching a strategic master plan initiative with a goal of creating a guide to preserve, restore, and utilize this iconic landmark that has attracted the faithful and visitors to Carmel since it was built more than 250 years ago.

The development of the comprehensive Master Property Plan will be in partnership with Architectural Resources Group, a nationally recognized preservation and planning firm out of San Francisco.

Architectural Resources Group was founded 45 years ago and specializes in architecture, historic preservation, adaptive reuse, and planning with projects across California and the Western United States. Locally, its portfolio includes the Cooper-Molera Adobe Historic site in Monterey and the Sunset Center in Carmel.

The architectural firm says that since its beginning, it has had the privilege of working with great clients and consultants on projects that preserve, protect, and adapt historic buildings, sites, and objects for a new generation.

"We're honored to continue our work with Carmel Mission. This is a pivotal project for the Mission and for the wider community", said David Wessel, principal at Architectural Resources Group, in a press release. "Our goal is to create a plan that respects Carmel Mission's rich past and supports its thriving future."

Carmel Mission Basilica says this initiative marks a milestone in the mission's commitment to stewarding its historic buildings, sacred spaces, and cultural resources for future generations.

Carmel Mission, or Mission San Carlos Borromeo de Río Carmelo, was founded in 1771 by Father Junipero Serra, who was canonized in 2015 and is now known as Saint Junipero Serra. He is buried under the sanctuary floor. The mission was the second mission founded by Serra, and where he established his headquarters. It is designated a National Historic Landmark, is one of California's most visited historic sites, and continues to serve a vibrant parish community within the Diocese of Monterey.

The new Master Property Plan will guide the preservation, restoration, and use of the 22-acre site, which includes the Basilica Church, museums, courtyards, cemetery, and other historic structures, according to Carmel Mission. Architectural Resources Group brings decades of expertise in working with culturally significant sites, including previous work with missions, churches, and historic campuses across the West.

"This is a moment of renewal," said Father Paul P. Murphy, pastor of the Carmel Mission Basilica, in the release. "We are embracing our responsibility to protect the sacred and historical integrity of this site, while also ensuring it can meet the evolving needs of our parish and the wider community."

The planning process will include input from parishioners, community members, preservationists, and expert restorative professionals, according to Carmel Mission. Priorities include seismic safety, accessibility improvements, landscape conservation, infrastructure modernization, and enhanced interpretive and visitor experiences.

Development of the Master Property Plan is expected to continue through 2026.

The Carmel Mission has undergone other restoration projects in the recent past, namely the Downie Museum and Basilica Forecourt project in 2021, the Central Courtyard project in 2016, and the Carmel Mission Basilica's structural restoration in 2013.

But the Carmel Mission has a long history of restoration beginning in 1877, when Fr. Angelo Casanova stepped in to save a church reduced to ruins, according to Carmel Mission Basilica. With the roof collapsed and walls crumbling, he paid \$44 to re-roof the sacristy. What started as a humble act became an enduring commitment to restore Carmel Mission's historic fabric for generations to come.

In the early 1900s, Monsignor Ramon Mestres founded the Carmel Mission Restoration League, spearheading major restorations and earning the title "Padre of the Restoration." Then in 1933, master restorer Harry Downie began five decades of meticulous rebuilding, working under the direction of multiple pastors throughout his tenure to transform the Mission into what we see today.

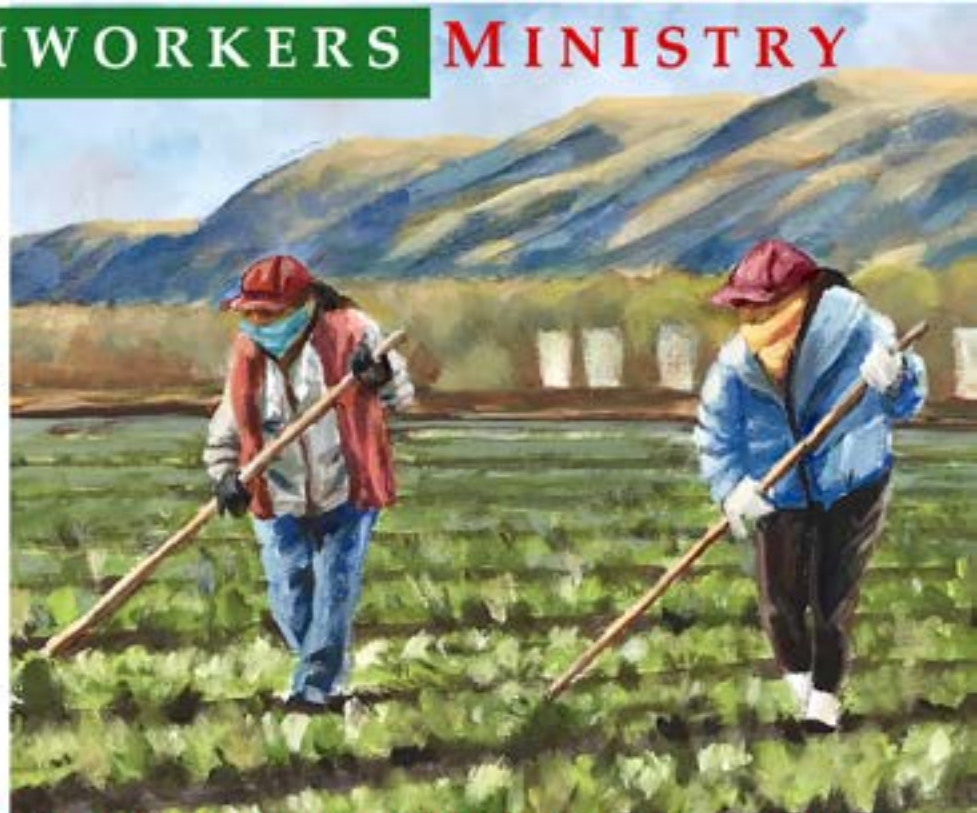




# FALGE FARMWORKERS MINISTRY
