



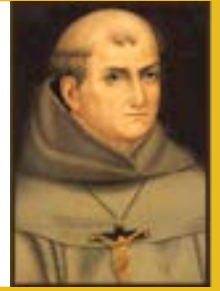

**Sunday of Divine Mercy,
Sunday, April 12, 2026**



Dear Friend of Carmel Mission,

In the Gospel today, the Risen Christ must now resurrect His community of believers, who are paralyzed with fear and grief and uncertain how to continue His mission, or if that is even possible. The frightened disciples are gathered behind locked doors. In the aftermath of Jesus' execution, their fear is understandable – will they be next? Into the midst of this fearful space, Jesus enters, inviting His disciples to accept the peace He desires for them. It is not a peace that ignores the brutality inflicted on Him, as He shows them the still visible wounds. It is a peace that recognizes full well the horror of what has occurred and results from the willingness to enter into the processes of healing, forgiveness, and reconciliation rather than retaliatory violence. An ability to see the wounds differently – not as something that needs to be avenged, but as something that Christ was already able to heal with His peace and His spirit, enables the disciples to let their fear give way to joy.

This results in the rebirth of the community. Just as the Creator brings to life the first human being by breathing into his nostrils (Gen 2:7), so the Risen Lord brings back to life the frightened community of His followers. For some, this rebirth takes place on the first day of the week after the Resurrection. The next week there are still some who are locked in their fear. They need to see with their own eyes and touch with their own hands. This is not stubborn resistance but a need from each one to come to faith through a direct, personal encounter with Christ. The testimony of other believers leads one to Jesus, but does not take the place of the tangible experience of Christ. The Gospel allows that there are different ways that people come to faith. No matter how one comes to believe, the Spirit breathes life into us all, dissolving fear by the use of peace, forgiveness, and reconciliation.

At this moment, our world is in desperate need of the peace Jesus offers His disciples in the Gospel - a peace that acknowledges difficulties and injustices, but works toward healing and reconciliation, not war and dominance. This week, please join me, our Holy Father, our US Conference of Bishops, and every person of good will who is raising their voice for this peace, in praying that God's peace will prevail in every area of conflict.

**Diocesan Decree for the
Year of St. Francis of Assisi**

Pope Leo XIV has proclaimed a special Jubilee Year from January 10, 2026, to January 10, 2027, to commemorate the eight hundredth anniversary of the death of Saint Francis of Assisi.

The Apostolic Penitentiary issued a decree granting the Plenary Indulgence under the usual conditions which can also be applied in the form of suffrage for the souls in Purgatory.

Besides offering the indulgence to all the Franciscan Families and anyone who observes the Rule of St. Francis, all the faithful without distinction can receive the indulgence *“by visiting in the form of a pilgrimage any Franciscan conventual church, or place of worship anywhere in the world dedicated to St. Francis or connected to him for any reason, and there they will devoutly follow the Jubilee rites or spend at least a suitable period of time in pious meditation and will raise prayers to God so that, following the example of St. Francis, may sentiments of Christian charity towards one's neighbor and authentic wishes for harmony and peace among peoples spring up in hearts, concluding with the Our Father, the Creed and invocations to the Blessed Virgin Mary, St Francis of Assisi, St Clare and all the saints of the Franciscan Family”* (Eighth Centenary of the death of St. Francis of Assisi, Apostolic Penitentiary Decree).

Therefore, I, the Most Rev. Ramon Bejarano, Bishop of the Diocese of Monterey, decree that the following churches/chapels are the pilgrimage destinations in this diocese for this special Jubilee.

1. **Old Mission San Juan Bautista and St. Francis Retreat Center, San Juan Bautista**, in the north of the Diocese.
2. **St. Paul the Apostle, Pismo Beach, CA** in the south of the Diocese.

The elderly, the sick and those who for serious reasons cannot leave home will also be able to obtain the plenary indulgence by spiritually joining the Jubilee celebrations and offering their prayers, pains, or sufferings to God.

Conditions for receiving the Indulgence *(for oneself or for the deceased)*

- Sacramental confession to be in God's grace *(within twenty days before or after)*.
- Participation in Mass and Eucharistic Communion.
- Visit in the form of a pilgrimage any Franciscan conventual church or place of worship dedicated to St. Francis anywhere in the world or designated by the local bishop.
- Renews one's profession of faith, through the recitation of the Creed.
- Recite the Lord's Prayer.
- Pray for the intentions of the Holy Father.

Scripture Reflection

It is unfortunate that we mostly know “Doubting Thomas” for the first half of today’s Gospel rather than his proclamation of Jesus’ identity. Apart from Peter’s response to Jesus in Matthew 16:16 “You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God”, one would be hard-pressed to find a more succinct, powerful and personal witness to Jesus. Of course, it took some time and experience of Jesus for Thomas to get there. Like the other disciples who gathered in the locked room, with the risen Christ Thomas needed a personal encounter with Jesus. However, he wanted this on his own terms, “Unless I see.....I will not believe.” In His generosity, Jesus meets Thomas in exactly this way, but also challenges him by saying, “Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed.” This challenge to Thomas is also a fourth wall breaking encouragement to those hearing the Gospel at the time of its writing, and for all of us today, who rely primarily on the experience of Jesus written down in the Scriptures. Insofar as we proclaim Jesus crucified and risen, we are truly blessed. That community is essential to Christian practice is featured in all our readings today. In the Gospel, we find the disciples gathered together when Jesus appears in their midst. In the first reading from Acts, the disciples share the joy of the resurrection by breaking bread together and sharing property in common. In the second reading from the First Letter of Peter, the audience is invited to rejoice together because of Jesus’ gift of “an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled and fading” – a gift that is given to us. The psalm is a joyful celebration after a victory. What greater victory is there than that of Christ over death? Each of the stanzas share something to give thanks for. The first is an invitation for the whole community to praise God and His mercy. In the second stanza, the psalmist shares his own struggle – “I was hard-pressed and was falling” – and God’s gift of strength and courage. In the third, the psalmist shares an important proverb, characteristic of God’s action throughout all of Scripture: “The stone which the builders rejected/has become the cornerstone.” That which is insignificant, forgotten and undeserving is placed at the center. This can refer to the kenosis and glorification of Jesus in His Passion and Resurrection, but also to God’s adoption of each of us as sons and daughters, despite our human failings. The psalm asks the question, “What are we grateful for this Easter season?”

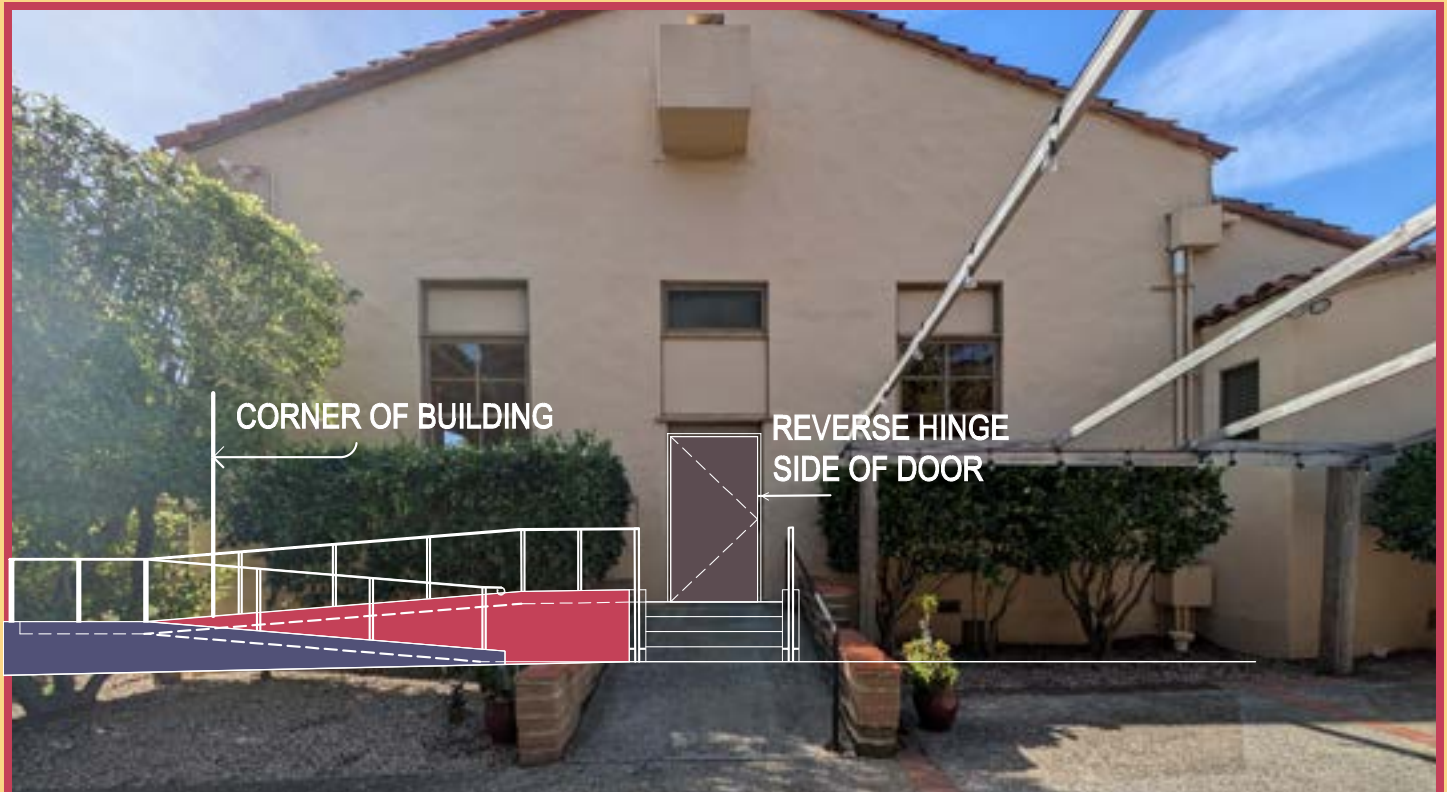

From the earliest days of Carmel Mission's history, restoration has never been simply a practical necessity — it has been an act of faith. Since its foundation, generations of parishioners, benefactors, clergy, and staff have poured their hearts into caring for and preserving this sacred place. Today, we are proud to share that we are living through one of the most significant periods of restoration in Carmel Mission's modern history.

Thanks to your generous support of our Annual Ministry Appeal (AMA), more conservation, preservation, and restoration work has been completed than in any other period of the Mission's history. The last 12–15 years mark the beginning of what we believe will be remembered as Carmel Mission's Modern Restoration Era, a time during which we all witnessed the canonization of St. Junipero.

Every dollar you have given to our AMA designated projects has gone — and will continue to go — directly toward this work.

A LIVING LEGACY OF STEWARDSHIP

Did you know that virtually every building at Carmel Mission, outside of the Basilica itself, has changed its purpose over the centuries? Crespi Hall once stood in the middle of our central courtyard. Each of these historic spaces has a story — one of adaptation, resilience, and the faithful care of those who came before us.

Under the leadership of Fr. Paul, our Mission has entered a new chapter of this story. His stewardship, combined with your support, has made it possible not only to restore what exists but also to develop a comprehensive vision for the future — one grounded in structural integrity, faithful preservation, and thoughtful planning.

RESTORATION: AT THE HEART OF OUR IDENTITY

AMA PROJECT UPDATES

Our AMA projects are not isolated efforts — they are interconnected chapters of a single, long-term restoration plan. Work on each project also enables us to evaluate building conditions, complete structural reports, and plan future campaigns with accuracy and confidence. Here is where each project stands today:

2024 PROJECT — BLESSED SACRAMENT CHAPEL (BSC) — In Progress

Phase 1 - The ramp, handrails, and door hardware work has been completed.

Additional work on the inside of the BSC revealed termite damage, significant plaster damage, exposed electrical wiring, damaged woodwork, and much needed painting. This work is being performed now, and we will reopen the BSC when complete.

Phase 2 - We plan to expand the pedestrian plaza from the visitor entrance to the BSC north entrance patio to provide an accessible entrance without stairs.

A seismic retrofit analysis and building condition evaluation have been completed, which informs future planning for a full building restoration.

2025 PROJECT — MORA CHAPEL PRESERVATION — Active Planning

The Mora Chapel project is one of our most ambitious undertakings — a coordinated effort to protect, catalog, and temporarily relocate sacred artifacts while the chapel undergoes restoration. Key elements include:

- Complete inventory and condition reporting of all artifacts in the Mora Chapel
- Careful removal and secure temporary storage of liturgical items
- Creation of a dedicated artifact conservation and storage workspace
- Structural and seismic evaluation of the chapel building
- Community updates and media documentation throughout the process

This project will also establish long-term infrastructure for artifact stewardship at Carmel Mission — a resource that will serve us for generations.

2026 PROJECT — A SAFE PATH OF TRAVEL — Project Launch March 21 & 22

This year's AMA campaign focuses on accessibility and safety across our campus, including:

- Crespi Hall accessible ramp
- Window and carpentry repairs
- Seismic structural evaluation of Crespi Hall
- Campus-wide parking lot improvements
- Unified path of travel connecting all buildings
- Exploration of a more accessible route to the Murphy parking lot

Because of the planning work completed during prior AMA campaigns, we enter 2026 with a clear scope, known costs, and a well-developed vision — something that would not have been possible without the groundwork laid together.

We are grateful for our parishioners' vigilance and care for this community. Together, we help keep Carmel Mission a welcoming and sacred space for all.



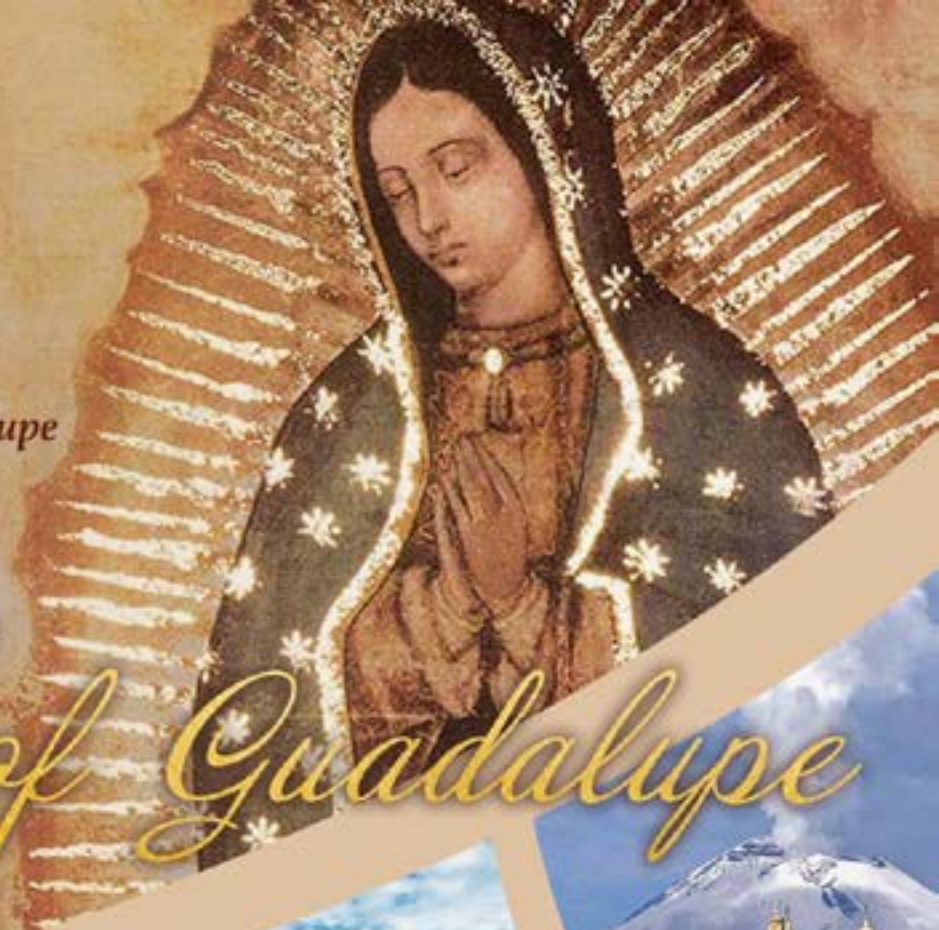

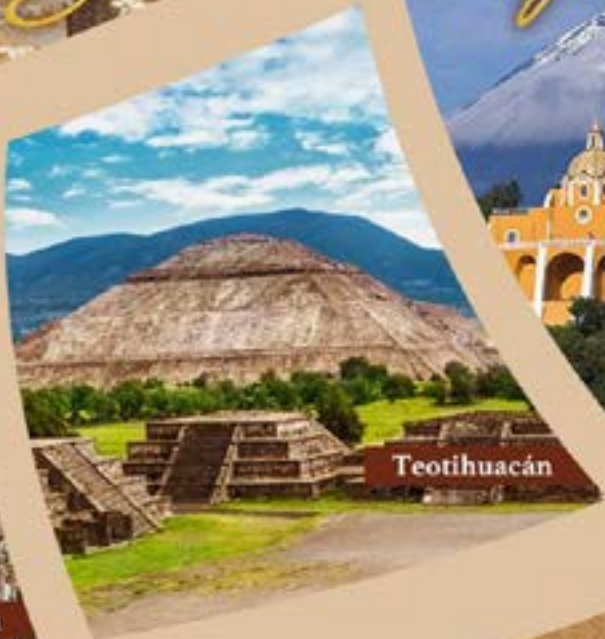
